

Ledile couldn't swim. What could she do?




Ledile broke a branch from a tree...

A tall man came to the river. Ledile asked for his help.




"I cannot swim, either," said the man.




Ledile decided to wade into the river up to her waist. Maybe then the stick would reach the balloon!

She took off her shoes.




She stepped into the river. The water was soon up to her knees.




She waded further into the river. The water reached her waist. She was scared--and she still could not reach the balloon!



Ledile hurried out of the water.




She was about to give up when she saw a small fish.

"I will try," said the fish.




The fish blew and blew, but the balloon did not budge.
